# **BIOSECURITY** UPDATE



# ADDRESSING IMPORTANT RISK FACTORS

Most of us understand the basics of keeping highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) out of the barn, but there are other easily managed factors that are often not considered.

# 1. WILD BIRDS, WILDLIFE AND RODENTS

- Wild birds, wildlife and other pests are a huge risk of introducing HPAI to your flock. Even with regular biosecurity controls in place, it's important to take a look at the property surrounding your barn and identify what could be attracting birds and animals. Mossy growth on the roof of outbuildings and sheds could be putting you at risk, and keeping them free of growth will make them less attractive to birds and critters.
- Consider using wild bird deterrents in key areas to decrease the risk of tracking disease on equipment and boots.
- Ponds on the farm property are another area of risk as they appeal to migratory birds.



Not only should you be looking at the surrounding area outside of buildings and sheds, but also consider what may be happening inside your buildings with the potential to spread disease. This can include:

- Ensuring there is proper pest control inside of sheds and outbuildings.
- Are you practicing biosecurity at the entry point to all farm buildings so you aren't spreading disease from one area to another? Proper cleaning of entry ways is important. When cleaning, start in restricted areas out to "dirty areas." Also be sure to disinfect all entry ways (suggest end of the day so that the proper contact time is achieved overnight).
- Making sure you have dedicated clothing for each production unit if you have multiple complexes.
- Are all family and/or farm employees following the same strict biosecurity procedures? Make sure everyone accessing the barn and property on a daily basis is trained on the biosecurity practices on the farm and that they understand the importance of following them at all times.
- Consider who is in charge of ensuring biosecurity is followed when you aren't there. Sometimes an absence isn't planned, as in the case of illness, so it's important to make sure procedures are still maintained.
- Control the visitors to your farm and limit to essential services only.

# 3. BUILDING MAINTENANCE

Although regular building maintenance is a large aspect of good farm management, sometimes unexpected events can make you more susceptible to the spread of disease. Damage to buildings caused by storms or floods should be repaired as quickly as possible. Not only can water coming into your barn create costly damage, it can also make an easy entry point for disease. Maintaining netting on ventilation systems can also provide an extra barrier to disease making it into the barn.

# 4. EQUIPMENT

Not only can disease be introduced via the feet of people, animals and rodents, it can make its way in via equipment. Limit access of introducing disease via shared equipment. This can be done by:

- Disinfecting items such as buckets, containers, and wheelbarrows.
- Making sure any construction debris from repairs is disposed of quickly and is not stored close to barns.
- Clean and disinfect any equipment that enters and leaves the barn.
- Regularly clean and disinfect the outside of vehicles including tractors, forklifts, pump trolleys, etc. upon entry or exit.

Reducing the risk of HPAI is always the goal. Following strict on-farm biosecurity protocols combined with these additional barriers will help towards the prevention of disease.

### **INGREDIENTS**

11/4 cups (310 ml) all-purpose flour

11/4 tsp (6 ml) baking powder

1/2 tsp (2 ml) kosher salt

1/3 cup (75 ml) unsalted butter, softened

3/4 cup (180 ml) granulated sugar

2 eggs

½ cup (125 ml) stirred, canned full fat coconut milk

1 tbsp (15 ml) fresh lime juice

1 tsp (5 ml) lime zest

1 tsp (5 ml) coconut extract

**Coconut White Chocolate Frosting:** 

1 tub (227 g) cream cheese, at room temperature

200 g good-quality white chocolate, melted

½ cup (125 ml) icing sugar

1/4 cup (60 ml) stirred canned full fat coconut milk

2 tsp (10 ml) coconut extract

½ tsp (2 ml) lime zest

½ cup (125 ml) sweetened flaked coconut, toasted

6 lime slices, halved

# **DIRECTIONS**

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder and salt.

In a large bowl, with an electric mixer on low speed, beat butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time; beat in coconut milk, lime juice, lime zest and coconut extract. Stir in flour mixture, quickly until combined, being careful not to overmix.

Line a 12-cup muffin pan with cup liners. Divide batter evenly among prepared muffin cups; about halfway.

Bake for about 11-13 minutes or until toothpick inserted into the centre comes out clean. Let cool in pan for 5 minutes. Transfer to a cooling rack and let cool completely.

Coconut White Chocolate Frosting: In a large bowl, with an electric mixer on medium speed, beat cream cheese, melted white chocolate, icing sugar, coconut milk, coconut extract and lime zest, scraping bowl as necessary; beat for 1 minute, until well blended. Cover and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes, until thickened and spreadable, or for up to 1 day.

Frost cupcakes evenly and sprinkle edge with toasted coconut. Garnish with lime slice.

# EGGS IN THE NEWS

RECIPE: Italian egg drop soup requires few ingredients, can be made in minutes

This Italian version of a traditional Chinese egg drop soup requires only a handful of ingredients and can be made in minutes with pre-prepared homemade or boxed broth.

Eggs are a nutrition powerhouse as a source of complete protein and several important nutrients. Eggs are also a good source of the fat-soluble vitamins A, D and E as well as vitamins B12, riboflavin, folate and the mineral selenium.

Did you know most of the eggs we buy in the grocery store are produced in our own backyard? Buying local eggs ensures freshness, is better for the environment and is a great way to support neighbouring farming communities.

# **INGREDIENTS**

 $6\,\mathrm{cups}\,(1500\,\mathrm{mL})\,\mathrm{chicken}$  or vegetable broth, homemade or store-bought

4 large eggs, beaten

4 ounces (113 grams) freshly grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese

 $2 \, \mathrm{cups} \, (500 \, \mathrm{mL}) \, \mathrm{baby} \, \mathrm{spinach}, \mathrm{cut} \, \mathrm{into} \, \mathrm{strips}$ 

1-2 cups (250-500 mL) sliced chicken, fish or shellfish, optional

Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

1 pinch of ground nutmeg, optional

 $1\,pinch\,of\,cayenne\,pepper, optional$ 

Freshly grated lemon zest and/or fresh lemon juice to taste, optional

Lemon slices to garnish, optional

2 tablespoons (30 mL) chopped fresh parsley to garnish, optional

### INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. In a large pot, bring the broth to a simmer and season with salt and pepper to taste.
- 2. Combine the beaten eggs, grated cheese, nutmeg, and cayenne pepper in a bowl.
- 3. While whisking the broth, slowly pour the egg mixture into the pot. Continue to whisk while bringing the soup back to a simmer.
- 4. Add spinach and chicken, fish or shellfish and heat until fully cooked.
- $5.\,\mathrm{Stir}\,\mathrm{the}\,\mathrm{soup}\,\mathrm{once}\,\mathrm{more}\,\mathrm{and}\,\mathrm{serve}\,\mathrm{hot}\,\mathrm{with}\,\mathrm{preferred}\,\mathrm{garnishes}.$
