EGG & PULLET FARMERS' WORKSHOP

The Egg & Pullet Farmers' Workshop was held on November 28 in Mississauga and included an agenda full of updates and farmer consultation sessions.

The morning session included a presentation from Egg Farmers of Canada on the *National Environmental Sustainability and Technology Tool* (NESTT) from Elyse Germain, Manager, Program Development and Roger Pelissero, EFC Chair. This was followed by a farmer consultation session on housing transition with three questions posed to start off round-table discussions.

Scott Helps (EFO Chair) started the afternoon off with a Strategic Plan



update, followed by a second farmer consultation session on pullet challenges. Both farmer consultations closed with roundtable reporting and questions.



On November 27, prior to the workshop, a *Communications and Interpersonal Skills* workshop was held with about 60 people attending. This full-day session featured case studies with interactive activities.

Protecting your farm from trespassers

The holidays can often be a time to be distracted from our usual routines and procedures. With that in mind, EFO wants to remind everyone to maintain a high-level of awareness and security to protect your farm, flock and family from unwanted visitors.

Good fencing and lighting, proper use of locks and no-trespassing signs are all ways to ensure you are not an easy target. Trespassers will look for an easy way in and will avoid well-lit, fenced off locations with extra security such as locks. Not all activity takes place during the day when you are around to see it!

Follow farm security and visitor protocols at all times, especially when any work is being done on your property. Ensure all employees are educated on the process for checking in and escorting visitors. As an additional precaution, visitors can be requested to sign a waiver prohibiting them from taking photographs and/or video on your farm.

If you have unwanted people on your property, inform them they are trespassing, contact police immediately to let them know you feel there is a risk to you, your family and your birds. Do not confront or interact any further with any intruders.



Voting Eligibility: All persons voting must qualify as a "producer" as defined in the Farm Products Marketing Act R.R.O. 1990, Regulation 409 Eggs-Plan. Under the Act, a "producer" means a person engaged in the production of chicks for placement, eggs, hatching eggs, or fowl.

Layer farmers encouraged to carry contingent business interruption insurance

Layer farmers make decisions about business interruption insurance on their layer operations and on pullets that they may grow for their own operations, but the Board would like to remind layer farmers that separate coverage – contingent business interruption insurance – is encouraged to cover pullets purchased from other growers.

Pullet farmers should also consider their own business interruption insurance. Consult with your insurance provider to see what is best for your operation.

Notice of Levy and Licence Fee Increase

Effective Sunday, December 31, 2023, the total Producer Levy & Licence Fee will be changed to forty-five point four five cents (45.45 cents) per dozen plus HST. The remittance is as follows: total deduction from Producer is 45.45 cents plus grading station voluntary research fee of .02 cents (per dozen, plus HST). In Zone 9N, the levy will be forty-four point four five cents (44.45 cents) per dozen plus HST. Please check your calculations to ensure that the correct amount of levy is remitted to the Egg Farmers of Ontario's Board office.



Black Forest Crinkle Cookies

Yield: 36 Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 30 minutes

Ingredients

2 cups (500 ml) all-purpose flour 2 tsp (10 ml) baking powder ¹/₂ tsp (2 ml) kosher salt 1¹/₂ cups (375 ml) granulated sugar 1 cup (250 ml) cocoa powder 3 eggs ¹/₃ cup (75 ml) grapeseed oil or another neutral-flavour oil 2 tsp (10 ml) vanilla extract 1 cup (250 ml) chopped dried cherries ¹/₂ cup (125 ml) mini semi-sweet or dark chocolate chips Icing sugar to coat cookies



TIP: Premade dough can be tightly wrapped and frozen for up to 2 weeks. Let thaw in the refrigerator before rolling and baking. Baked cookies can be kept in a container at room temperature for up to 3 days.

EGGS IN THE NEWS REPORT

Canadians overwhelmingly support supply management and homegrown food security

A recent survey conducted by Abacus Data delves into Canadians' perspectives on the food system and the value they place on the system of supply management.

According to the findings, 9 in 10 Canadians say it's important to them that the dairy, eggs,

chicken and turkey they buy come from Canada. This sentiment is strong across multiple demographics and geographical regions, reflecting a shared belief in the benefits of this approach.

The Abacus survey highlights that 94% of Canadians consider it a 'good thing' when they hear that local dairy, poultry and egg products are produced with high standards of food safety and animal care under supply management.

Notable findings include:

• 97% of respondents feel it is important that Canada has strong domestic food supply chains that allow us to produce enough food to feed Canadians yearround; and 94% of Canadians prefer their dairy, eggs, chicken, and turkey products to be produced locally and in Canada under supply management.

The survey, conducted online with a sample size of 2,000 adult Canadians from November 9 to 12, 2023, provides insights into the importance Canadians attribute to a strong domestic supply of dairy, eggs, chicken, and turkey.

Direction

Preheat oven to 350°F (180°C).

In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder and salt.

In a large bowl, whisk together sugar, cocoa, eggs, oil and vanilla. Stir in flour mixture, cherries and chocolate chips.

Roll dough into $1\frac{1}{2}$ tbsp balls and roll to coat in icing sugar. Place 12 balls on a parchment-lined baking sheet and bake in oven for 9-10 minutes or until puffed but cracks are still moist on the tops.

Repeat to make approximately 36 cookies. Let cool a few minutes before removing cookies to a cooling rack to cool completely.

Nutrients per serving (1 cookie or 1/36 recipe): 120 calories, 4 g total fat, 40 mg sodium, 21 g carbohydrates, 1 g fibre, 13 g sugars, 2 g protein.

OUTREACHUPPlate

2023 Royal Agricultural Winter Fair

In addition, EFO sponsored five culinary academy cooking sessions within the Burnbrae Culinary Academy. Participants in each session were taught how to cook egg dishes with help from five celebrity chefs.

Grey Cup Festivities

Through EFO's partnership with Hamilton Sports Group, EFO participated in the Y*WCA Young Trailblazers Rise & Shine Breakfast* on November 16. The breakfast, which hosted about 600 young women, featured Canadian women's basketball Olympic team member Kia Nurse, who gave the keynote address and farmer Tonya Haverkamp (Zone 7). EFO staff were also on-hand with resources and activities including an "egg-toss" game.

RENEW Breakfast Fundraiser

The Community of Christ Church in Stratford held a breakfast on November 26 in support of the Rights and Economic Development for Nepal's Empowered Women (RENEW) project.

Following the breakfast, which raised about \$5,000 for the project, a presentation about the 2022 trip was shared by Scott & Laurie Graham (Zone 6) and Donna Lange (EFO Director of Public Affairs). 2023 trip team member Tonya Haverkamp also provided details about the upcoming trip.
